Census Records

Census records can provide the building blocks of your research. The first Federal Population Census was taken in 1790, and has been taken every ten years since. Because of a 72-year restriction on access to the Census, the most recent year available is 1940. The 1950 Census will be released in 2022.

The National Archives has the census schedules on microfilm available from 1790 to 1940, and most have now been digitized by our digitization partners. Family researchers generally find it most helpful to begin with the most current census and work backwards as a strategy for locating people in earlier generations.

Tract Books:

There are also tract books available relating to the land entry case files. These are arranged by the legal description of the land: by township, range, and section. Tract books are divided into two geographical areas, Eastern States and Western States.

For the **Western States**, the tract books are located in the National Archives Building in Washington, DC and some NARA Field Offices. This includes the states of: Alaska, Arizona, California, Colorado, Idaho, Kansas, Montana, Nebraska, Nevada, New Mexico, North Dakota, Oklahoma, Oregon, South Dakota, Utah, Washington, and Wyoming.

For the **Eastern States**, the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) has the tract books and patents. This includes the states of: Alabama, Arkansas, Florida, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Louisiana, Michigan, Minnesota, Mississippi, Missouri, Ohio, and Wisconsin.

Even though the entry was never patented there can be as much information in these case files as patented files. Land entry files (land patent files) are records of the U.S. General Land
Office (GLO) that document the initial transfer of public lands from the U.S.
Government to individuals, businesses, and institutions.

The National Archives Building in Washington, DC (Archives 1), houses land entry files from the 30 Federal public land states (all states in the United States except the original 13 states, Vermont, Kentucky, Tennessee, Maine, West Virginia, Texas, and Hawaii). These records are part of Record Group 49, Records of the Bureau of Land Management (BLM).

The information required to access and order copies of land entry files will differ depending on the type of land entry file.

Types of Land Entry Files

Land entry files at Archives 1 are divided into three rough categories: (1) surrendered military bounty land warrants, (2) pre-1908 general land entry files, and (3) 1908 and later land entry files.

Researchers can search the BLM's GLO Records website to find the information needed to request each type of land entry file. Note that the GLO Records website only indexes patented or completed land entries. The site does not index cancelled land entries or expired leases.





The National Archives Building in Washington, DC (Archives 1), houses records relating to soldiers and military units from the Revolutionary War up to (but not including) World War I. Other records cover administrative aspects of the War Department, military departments and commands, and veterans' benefits. We also house records of the Freedmen's Bureau.






Army Records by Record Group Number

Compiled Military Service Records

Beginning in the 1890s, the War Department created the Compiled Military Service Record (CMSR) to document the military service of Volunteer soldiers. Transcribed from original muster and pay rolls, regimental returns, descriptive books, hospital rolls, and other records, the CMSRs were intended to permit more rapid and efficient checking of military and medical records in connection with claims for pensions and other veterans' benefits.

The War Department initially created CMSRs for Union veterans of the Civil War and later expanded the records to include state Volunteers from other conflicts. As a result, the National Archives now holds CMSRs for Volunteer soldiers from the Revolutionary War through the Philippine Insurrection.

Contents of CMSRs

The CMSR contains basic information about a Volunteer soldier's military career, and it is the first source that researchers should consult. The CMSR includes an envelope (jacket) containing one or more cards. A separate card was prepared each time an individual's name appeared on a muster roll, pay roll, or other document. These cards were all numbered on the back, and these numbers were entered onto the outside jacket containing the cards. The numbers on the jacket correspond with the numbers on the cards within the jacket.

CMSRs typically indicate that the soldier was present or absent during a certain period of time. Other basic information contained on the cards may include:

- · Full name
- · Date(s) of enlistment
- · Period(s) of service
- Residence at the time of enlistment (which may or may not be the same as place of birth)
- Personal description, including age, height, hair and eye color, and complexion
 Other cards may indicate pay rates and bounty, and other information such as promotions, wounds received during battle, or hospitalization for injury or illness.

The CMSR may contain an internal jacket for so-called "personal papers" of various

CMSRs, indexes, and related records are housed at the National Archives Building in Washington, DC (Archives 1). CMSRs can be researched on site or copies can be ordered remotely. Many indexes to CMSRs and some CMSRs have been digitized and made available online.

CMSRs are available for Volunteer soldiers from the Revolutionary War through the Philippine Insurrection.

Available CMSRs



Southern Claims Commission Case Files

The Southern Claims Commission (SCC) was created by an Act of Congress on March 3, 1871, to receive, examine, and consider claims submitted by Southern Unionist citizens.

Claimants sought compensation for supplies that had been confiscated by or furnished to the U.S. Army during the Civil War. After an additional act in 1872, the SCC also considered claims against the U.S. Navy.

The SCC certified the Union loyalty of the claimant, determined the appropriate value of the claim, and recommended that the U.S. House of Representatives allow, disallow, or bar the claim. Settled claims were reported to Congress.

Of the 22,298 claims, only 7,092 satisfied the rigid tests of sworn statement and cross-examination used to prove both the sustained Union loyalty of the claimant throughout the war and the validity of the claim.

An SCC case file may contain:

- Claimant's petition for payment
- · Depositions of witnesses
- . Summary reports of the special agent investigating the case
- Reports from Treasury Department officials who checked captured Confederate records for indications of disloyalty
- · Final summary and recommendation of the commissioners
- Receipt of payment

Some files include additional documentary evidence such as:

- · Letters of affidavit
- · Reports by special agents
- · Marriage and death certificates

However, not all files include all of these records.

Locating SCC Case Files

To locate a particular SCC case file, researchers should check **Microfilm Publication M87** (2), *Records of the Commissioners of Claims*. **Roll 14** of this publication includes a consolidated index of claims. The index is arranged alphabetically by the petitioner's name and gives the state of residency, office number, report number, and final disposition.

The case files are found in different record groups, depending on the SCC's decision in the case. The index indicates which decision was issued for each case.

What military records does NARA have?

The National Archives holds Federal military service records from the Revolutionary War to 1912 in the National Archives Building in Washington, D.C. See details of holdings.

Military records from WWI - present are held in the National Military Personnel Records Center (NPRC), in St. Louis, Missouri, See details of holdings.

The National Archives does not hold state militia records. For these records, you will need to contact the appropriate State Archives.

How can Military Records help in my genealogy research?

Military records can often provide valuable information on the veteran, as well as on all members of the family. For example:

Compiled Service Records:

Compiled service records consist of an envelope containing card abstracts taken from muster rolls, returns, pay vouchers, and other records. They will provide you with your ancestor's rank, unit, date mustered in and mustered out, basic biographical information, medical information, and military information.

• Pension Applications and Pension Payment Records:

The National Archives also has pension applications and records of pension payments for veterans, their widows, and other heirs. The pension records in the National Archives Building in Washington, D.C. are based on service in the armed forces of the United States between 1775 and 1916. Pension application files usually provide the most genealogical information. These files often contain supporting documents such as: narratives of events during service, marriage certificates, birth records, death certificates, pages from family Bibles, family letters, depositions of witnesses, affidavits, discharge papers and other supporting papers.

The National Archives at San Francisco holds comprehensive inmate case files, prisoner identification photographs, and warden's notebook pages for most listed inmates. For more information about these records, please contact us.

The bulk of our facility's RG 129 archival holdings concern Alcatraz Island its use by the Department of Justice's Bureau of Prisons (BOP) as a Federal penitentiary (1934-63). They include individual comprehensive immate case files (approximately 541 cubic feet), administrative records (approximately 11 cubic feet), supply, equipment, and facilities maintenance files (approximately three cubic feet), the Wardens' notebook pages (approximately five cubic feet), copy negatives & black and white prints of prisoner identification photographs (three cubic feet), and a few maps and drawings. The bulk of the records are dated 1934 through 1963, but include records dated as early as 1910 and as late as 1988.

These records may contain information that is restricted under Freedom of Information Act (5 U.S.C. §552) provisions that protect the privacy of living persons. Public access to portions of the documents researchers request may be restricted under exemption (b)(6) of the Freedom of Information Act (FOIA), which relates to clearly unwarranted invasion of personal privacy.





What time periods are covered by these records?

Bankruptcy case files were created by the Federal court to contain the records of bankruptcy case proceedings. The content varies depending on the type of bankruptcy and the time period in which the case was filed. There have been

five major Bankruptcy Acts by the Federal government: 1800, 1841, 1867, 1898, and 1978.

Generally, bankruptcy proceedings 1940 and prior are permanent records. Case files opened after 1940 may be subject to a 2.5% sampling*. This is dependent on the type of filing. The goal of the sampling is not to save individual cases,

of people file for bankruptcy (e.g. the poor, the working class, male, female, urban, rural, etc.), why they file (e.g. medical bills, luxury items, job loss), where they live, what their jobs are, how bankruptcy filings are affected by national, regional, or local economic conditions, and similar issues.

What is the research value of Bankruptcy Case Files?

Bankruptcy case files are valuable for a number of reasons. Many individuals need to access their own bankruptcy case files for a variety of circumstances. The case files prove the discharge of, or final disposition of particular debts.

Attorneys and other court officials likewise use bankruptcy case files in both reviews of past legal matters, as well as new disputes regarding debt.

Bankruptcy case files are also valuable for genealogists. By showing everything an individual owned and to whom they owed money, bankruptcy files open the door into the homes of our ancestors. The details revealed in the case files allows the researcher to understand so much more than what a name and a date alone provide. They help a researcher understand why a path guided an ancestor in a particular direction.

What is in the National Archives Catalog?

The National Archives holds historical U.S. government documents (federal, congressional, and presidential records) that are created or received by the President and his staff, by Congress, by employees of Federal government agencies, and by the Federal courts in the course of their official duties.

The National Archives Catalog contains descriptions for NARA's nationwide holdings in the Washington, DC area; regional facilities; and Presidential Libraries. The Catalog is a work in progress and currently contains descriptions for 95% of our records, described at the series

Tips for Searching for an Individual's Name

There isn't a specific field for names in the Catalog; as a result you many need to try several different searches using different strategies when searching for a name.

- · Search on the person's full name in first name-last name order.
- · Search on the surname only. The records might only include a first initial or a variant spelling of the first name.
- Search on variant spellings of the surname using OR, for example: Luchetti OR Lucetti.
- · Search on variant spellings of the first name, including "Americanized" versions, for example: Joseph Maggio OR Guiseppe Maggio.
- Keep in mind that most descriptions in the National Archives Catalog do not include the names of individuals in that record. However, the National Archives still might have records about your ancestors. If you know an individual participated in event, search for that search term and look within the records for your ancestor.

Tips for Searching by Topics

One of the best ways to identify records of genealogical interest in the National Archives Catalog is by topic. If you find a description without digital images attached in the National Archives Catalog, that may contain records about your ancestor, contact the staff in that unit. The contact information appears in the Contact(s) section at the bottom of the description.

Suggested Keywords

Revolutionary War Pension and Bounty Land Warrant Application File W. 27,862, John Van Eps, New York



Each record contains the combined readings from the first two scans of each enlistment punch card although each card was scanned up to ten times. While these additional scans may have produced additional information from the card, NARA did not use a more complex algorithm to include the information from these subsequent scans to create a better "guess" than what currently appears in the series "World War II Army Enlistment Records, 2002."

Therefore NARA has retained the series "Electronic Army Serial Number Raw Files, 1994-2002," should researchers want to re-process the raw data with the information from all of the scans and to try to create a file with possibly more accurate records.

Reproduced in this microfiche publication are approximately 7,000 disapproved pension applications of widows and other dependents of U.S. Navy veterans who served between 1861 and 1910. The applications, generally made between 1861 and 1910, are commonly referred to as "Navy Widows' Originals" and are part of Records of the Veterans Administration, Record Group (RG) 15.

BACKGROUND

Prefederal Pensions

Pension payments for disabled soldiers and sailors were granted by American colonial governments for more than a century before the beginning of the Revolutionary War. During and after that war, the U.S. Government continued this practice and expanded it to include dependents of disabled soldiers and sailors.

The act of July 14, 1862, also provided that in case an officer or enlisted man died as a result of military service, his widow, children, or, if there were no widow or children, his mother and/or orphan sister(s) dependent upon him for support. would receive the same pension the officer or enlisted man would have received for total disability. In order for a mother to receive a pension based on her son's service, she could not be receiving a widow's pension at the time of application. The mother's or widow's pension terminated if she remarried, and an unmarried sister's pension ceased when she reached the age of 16. This act also precluded widows, children, or other heirs from receiving pensions if they had aided the Confederate cause. The system of benefits provided by the July 14, 1862, act and later legislation, which involved more liberal benefits, came to be known as the "general law pension system." It was the only pension system in effect for Civil War survivors and their dependents until 1890.

Pension Application Procedures

Pension application procedures varied according to the act under which benefits were sought. Generally, the process required an applicant to appear before a court of record in the State of his or her residence to describe under oath the service for which a pension was claimed. A veteran's widow was also required to provide information concerning the date and place of her marriage. The application statement or "declaration," as it was usually called, was submitted on a form provided by the Bureau of Pensions. It, along with supporting papers such as property schedules, marriage records, and affidavits of witnesses, was certified by the court and forwarded to an official, usually the Commissioner of Pensions in the Interior Department, responsible for administering the specific act under which the claim was being made. Applicants were

This act also stipulated that the widow of a black or Indian soldier or sailor was entitled to receive a pension if the soldier or sailor died from wounds or injuries received

while in the line of duty. The only proof of marriage required of the widows of these soldiers or sailors was that they possess evidence of having been joined in marriage "in some ceremony deemed by them obligatory" or have evidence that they recognized each other "and were so recognized by their neighbors" as man and wife at the date of enlistment or at the date of death of the soldier or sailor, if he died after leaving service. Further-

more, the children of these marriages were recognized as the soldier's or sailor's legal heirs. These provisions applied only to those black or Indian soldiers or sailors who had enlisted before the passage of this act.

Citizenship-related Reference Reports

The National Archives holds records pertaining to various aspects of U.S. citizenship. Since 1790, naturalization records have documented the process by which foreign-born persons (aliens) became American citizens, while passports, protection certificates, and other maritime records were used by U.S. citizens and merchant seaman to verify and safeguard their American nationality while traveling abroad. During the Civil War, both the Federal Government and the Confederate States government compiled records relating to Southern civilians, or Confederate citizens, including amnesty records to restore U.S. citizenship to former Confederates once the war was over.

Citizenship Reference Reports describe research strategies using Federal naturalization records, State Department passport applications, and seamen's protection certificates and vessel crew lists from the U.S. Customs service and the Immigration and Naturalization Service (INS). The reports also cover more specialized topics including U.S. citizens who died overseas, as well as certain rights and activities enjoyed by U.S. citizens, such as submitting private claims to Congress and the Southern Claims Commission, participating in New Deal public relief programs during the Great Depression, and attending significant national events such as the Philadelphia Centennial Exhibition of 1876.

Records of the U.S. Congress Relating to Private Claims

Private claims, both received and created by Congress beginning in 1789, document congressional actions on submitted claims covering a wide range of topics, such as compensation for military service; land disputes; damages to persons or property caused by representatives of the American government, foreign governments, or Native Americans; and the removal of political disabilities imposed on former citizens of the Confederates States following the Civil War.

Types of Records

Private claims can include the claimant's petition, supporting affidavits, a bill introduced on the claimant's behalf, a committee report, and correspondence from the appropriate Federal agency as well as interested individuals.

Information Required for a Search

Researchers interested in locating private claims must know the name of the claimant, the Congress into which the claim was introduced, the chamber that considered the claim (either the House of Representatives or the Senate), and the committee(s) to which the claim was referred. Claims brought before the House of Representatives are in Records of the U.S. House of Representatives (Record Group 233); those brought before the Senate are in Records of the U.S. Senate (Record Group 46). The records are in the custody of the Center for Legislative Archives at the National Archives Building in Washington, DC.

Finding Aids

Congress printed special indexes to private claims as part of the U.S. Congressional *Serial Set*. Each index is arranged alphabetically by surname of the claimant and shows the nature or object of the claim, the Congress and session into which the claim was introduced, the committee to which it was referred,

From 1775 to the early 20th century, the United States engaged in numerous military conflicts, both internally and against foreign foes. These wars were fought by the U.S. military establishment, including the Regular Army, Navy, and Marine Corps, as well as by citizen volunteers in State and local militias called into Federal service. Military Reference Reports describe research strategies for frequently used records relating to military service in the Revolutionary War (1775-83), War of 1812 (1812-15), Old Indian Wars (1817-58), Mexican War (1846-48), Civil War (1861-65), Spanish-American War (1898), and Philippine Insurrection (1899-1902). Related topics also include pension and bounty-land records, prisoners of war, and some 20th-century draft records (World War I and World War II).

Regular and Volunteer United States Military Service Between the Revolutionary War and the War of 1812

The National Archives holds records relating to the United States regular and volunteer military service between the Revolutionary War and the War of 1812. Regular military forces are also known as standing military forces. Volunteers served for short terms of service during a specific war and usually did not make a career of the military.

Service in the Regular Army

M233, Registers of Enlistments in the United States Army, 1798–1914. 81 rolls. DP. Arranged chronologically and then alphabetically by the first letter of the soldier's surname. These records were created from enlistment papers, muster rolls, and other sources. With the exception of pensions, these records may be the only source on enlisted men during the 19th century. The registers may show when and where the soldier enlisted, the period of enlistment, the place of birth, the age at enlistment, civilian occupation, a physical description, and the unit to which he was assigned.

__M1856, Discharge Certificates and Miscellaneous Records Relating to the Discharge of Soldiers from the Regular Army, 1792–1815. 6 rolls. DP. Arranged by regiment, company, and then alphabetically by surname. The descriptive pamphlet has an alphabetical listing of the soldiers' names. These records relate exclusively to the discharge of soldiers from the regular army; no militiamen or volunteers are included. Most of the discharges date from 1812 to 1815, but a few date from the 1790s. These files may include a certificate of discharge, a descriptive list, a certificate of death, or a pay voucher.

Compiled Military Service Records (CMSRs)

In the 1890s, the Department of War used numerous sources, such as muster rolls, descriptive rolls, and pay rolls to create compiled military service records (CMSRs). These records generally show when a soldier joined a unit and if he was present when the unit was mustered.



Anne Kerny wailed and moaned as the *Garrick* sailed to America during the worst winter of Ireland's Great Famine. Somewhere in the Atlantic, before the ship reached New York City on January 20, 1848, the cries of the baby she delivered also filled the steerage compartment.

Bridget Kerny was not the only newborn of the 40-day journey from Liverpool.1 The *Garrick* was nearly a nursery, with 33 children born at sea among the 478 aboard, according to the Famine Irish Passenger Record Data File held at the National Archives and Records Administration (NARA). Two of the babies died before the ship nudged the dock.

The online database shows 8,075 births at sea among more than 410,000 Irish passengers to arrive in New York from January 1846 through December 1851, the teeth of the Famine years. Of these newborns, 452 died, among 2,883 total reported fatalities. That's a nearly three-to-one ratio of births-to-deaths, and an extra 7,623 passengers who did not embark from Irish or

Where'd They Go?

Finding Ancestral Migrations in Federal Records

However, our ancestors were mobile as well. Families were often moving, sometimes across an ocean, but just as often via land routes to the western frontier. Knowing where they went, how they got there, and why they moved can add flavor and depth to our research and family knowledge.

Figuring it all out can be very complicated but fascinating. This article describes a few of the federal records that can be helpful for this type of research.

WHAT DO YOU NEED TO KNOW

BEFORE DOING MIGRATION RESEARCH?

It's helpful to know at least where the family started or where they ended up. For example, the Ide family ended up in Vermont, but where did they come from? A Revolutionary War pension file provides the answer to where the soldier was born as well as where his wife and children were born.¹

If you can locate the family in a census from 1880 or later, you will find information on not only the person you're researching but also his or her parents' places of birth. The 1870 census asks for the number of adult males in the household who are United States citizens, and the 1830 census asked if there were any aliens in the household. If your ancestor was born somewhere other than the United

How it Works

You can take home a digital copy of your scans free of charge on your own USB drive, and we'll upload a copy to the National Archives Catalog (please note: uploading to the Catalog will take 8-10 weeks). Where possible, we'd like you to scan the entire folder of the material that you are using.


Currently, you can walk in and request documents from the four most-requested types of records:

- · Compiled Military Service Records
 - These records contain abstracts taken from muster rolls, pay vouchers, and other records, and provide a basic
 picture of the soldier's biographical and military information. CMSRs dating from after the Revolutionary War
 through the Philippine Insurrection are available to scan.
- Pension Files
 - Pension files contain the soldier's (or their dependent's) application for a pension, as well as supporting evidence such as affidavits, medical records, marriage records, and often other documents. Pension files based on military service between 1783 and 1903 are available to scan.
- · Bounty Land Records
 - Bounty Land files contain the application of the veteran (or their dependent), as well as supporting evidence such as commissions, discharges, or affidavits.
 Approved applications also contain information about the land granted. Bounty Land files based on military service between 1790 and 1855 are available to scan
- Carded Medical Records (1780s-1917)
 - These records contain information from other records, such as hospital registers, rolls, and reports, which relate to the medical treatment of individuals in military service or in military hospitals. Carded Medical Records dating from after the Revolutionary War through 1912 are available to scan.

Indian Scout Pension Files

Indian Scouts were a vital part of the U.S. Army's campaigns in the post–Civil War West. Pension files are a rich source of information, not only about the soldier who served but also about their families and comrades.

Buffalo Soldiers Pension Files

Following the success of the United States Colored Troops' actions during the Civil War, the U.S. Army created African American peacetime regiments. Pension files can be a great source of genealogical information such as names of family members, home addresses, and details about the pension applicant's life. These files can also be useful for historians, students, and others who are interested in firsthand evidence of the experiences of 19th-century African American soldiers and their families.

20th Maine Infantry Regiment Compiled Military Service Records

This Civil War regiment fought in dozens of engagements from 1862 to 1865, including the Battles of Shepherdstown, the Wilderness, and Appomattox Court House, and are known for the bayonet charge by which they defended Little Round Top at Gettysburg.

Maps at NARA of interest to Genealogists

The National Archives and Records Administration (NARA) has custody of over 5 million maps. Maps and related cartographic records are often useful for genealogical research. They can:

- provide important information on place names and localities at the time the maps were created
- show changing political boundaries, counties and minor civil subdivisions
- sometimes include names of individual land owners or residents.

The following cartographic series have particular significance to genealogists and may be used in the Cartographic and Architectural Research Room of the National Archives in College Park, MD.

Census:

• Census enumeration district maps were prepared by the Bureau of the Census decennially from 1880 to 1970. They consist of approximately 110,000 printed, photocopied, and manuscript maps of cities, counties, lesser political units, and unincorporated areas. Only three maps exist for 1880, but the number of available maps increases with each succeeding census. The maps, arranged alphabetically by name of state, and thereunder by name of county and locality, are in Record Group (RG) 29, Records of the Bureau of the Census. 

General Land Office Records

Among the Records of the Bureau of Land Management, RG 49, are several cartographic series of interest to genealogists. These holdings include approximately 20,000 headquarters office township survey plats retained by the General Land Office in Washington, DC, and more than 22,000 local office plats used by the local land office having jurisdiction over specified townships. Among the holdings are manuscript headquarters plats for the states of Illinois, Indiana, lowa, Kansas, Missouri, and parts of Ohio, including the "Old Seven Ranges." Local office plats are available for Alabama, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Mississippi, Missouri, Wisconsin, and parts of Ohio, Oklahoma, Oregon, and Washington.





Military Records

Manuscript, annotated, and printed maps, plans, and charts were compiled or collected by various military organizations, ca. 1770-1960. Of foremost importance are those among the Records of the Office of the Chief of Engineers, RG 77, the organization responsible for most of the military mapping pertaining to civil works, exploration, military campaigns, and fortifications in the United States during the 18th, 19th, and 20th centuries. Map coverage is most heavily concentrated in, but not limited to, areas of substantial Federal activity. Notable are detailed area and county maps of parts of Arkansas, Georgia, Louisiana, Maryland, Texas, and Virginia during the 1860s; maps of colonies, states, and territories; city plans; and maps of canals and roads. These records are usually arranged by state or region (by subject for canals and roads), and thereunder primarily chronologically. These records frequently indicate roads, canals, and waterways that could have been migration routes. They may include the names of residents, boundaries of civil divisions, inns, mills, churches, mountains, and other cultural and physical features.

Other records of particular interest to genealogists are those of the Army Graves Registration Service among the Records of the Office of the Quartermaster General, RG 92, and the Records of the American Battle Monuments Commission, RG 117. These maps, plans, diagrams, and tables provide the names and service numbers of some of the U.S. military personnel from both World War I and World War II who are buried overseas. The records are incomplete and unindexed for the purpose of locating individual names, but they do provide the locations of and plans for specific cemeteries. In addition, there are a limited number of similar records covering some Civil War cemeteries in the South for Union dead and a few Confederate soldiers. Only a few names of individuals are provided in these Civil War records.



Other Cartographic Records of Genealogical Interest

• The Department of Agriculture prepared and published small scale civil division maps of the United States decennially for the years 1840-1900. Similar maps are also available for 1909, 1915, 1920, 1931, 1935, and 1940. These maps indicate county boundaries and names as they then existed within all states and territories of the continental United States. During the 1930s, approximately 2,200 civil division maps spanning the period 1789-1932 were prepared in conjunction with a Work Projects Administration (WP A) study known as the Atlas of Congressional Roll Calls.

- Regional and state postal route maps in the Records of the Post Office Department, RG 28, are dated 1839-1960. Rural delivery route maps cover the period 1900-37. State and regional postal route maps show county names and boundaries, post offices and delivery routes, and distances and frequency of service between post offices. Names of individuals are sometimes shown on rural delivery maps.
- The Geological Survey records contain manuscript and published topographical quadrangle maps, 1888-present. They indicate extensive cultural and physical features such as county and township names and boundaries, towns, roads, railroads, houses, schools, churches, cemeteries, mountains, valleys, streams, and lakes.

Civil War Records in the Cartographic Research Room

The Cartographic Branch holds over 8,000 maps, charts, and plans relating to the Civil War. These records cover a wide range of subjects, including battles and skirmishes, fortifications, supporting facilities such as cemeteries and hospitals, and ship plans. They include manuscripts, printed, and published materials. Many of the published maps are annotated to show troop movements or positions.

The vast majority of the maps and records are Federal in origin, and were created by or for Union forces or other US government agencies. Many of the records date to the war itself, although some items also date to the post-war era, particularly maps made to accompany official government publications and reports. The holdings also include some Confederate maps and records.

The best overall resource for learning more about Civil War records held by the Cartographic Branch is the Guide to Civil War Maps in the National Archives . Additional finding aids and resources are available in the Cartographic Research Room in College Park, Maryland.

Types of Contributions

Tagging

Tagging is a fun and easy way for you to help make National Archives records more searchable in our catalog. By adding keywords, terms, and labels to a record, you can do your part to help the next person discover that record.

There are two ways to add tags:

- 1. Place tags on the left side column to tag the entire record
- 2. Add tags directly to an individual page under the image using "View/Add Contributions" and select the Tag tab.

Tags can contain these special characters: $! # $ \% * /? ^{[]}~()[]\;: ".'@_$

Dashes cannot be included in tags.

Separate multiple tags with commas.

The best tags for photographs and graphic materials are when you identify objects or concepts not included in the title or scope and content note of the description. By adding this kind of metadata to records in the catalog, you help make content more discoverable online.

Transcription

All documents are unique and may contain various aspects such as stamps, tables, or charts. Type what you see and follow the order and layout as best you can. Type words exactly as they are written in the document; this includes capitalization, abbreviations, names, dates, and even misspelled words.

Why do we transcribe even typewritten records? The words within those documents are often not picked up by a search in the catalog. When you transcribe, you type exactly what you see in the document, which then makes that content searchable for you or for the next user. When transcribing, don't worry too much about matching the exact format of the original document, but instead think about how transcribing the text will improve our ability to read the documents, search for them, and use the information they contain.




