Commemorating the Great War


April 6, 2017 marks the 100th anniversary of the U.S. entry into World War I. As the largest repository of American World War I records, the National Archives holds a wealth of records and information documenting the U.S. experience in this conflict, including photographs, documents, audiovisual recordings, educational resources, articles, blog posts, lectures, and exhibits.



In commemoration of this event, we've launched a <u>World War I research portal</u> with the goal of creating a central space for all National Archives resources and content related to World War I for use by researchers, students and educators, and those curious about the War.




Browse our interactive timeline that includes newly digitized motion pictures, records from battles, major events and everyday activities during the war.

Tag details and features of these photographs for the Food Administration's Anti-Waste campaign.




World War I Transcription Mission

Bureau of Pensions: <u>Case Files of Pension and Bounty-Land Warrant</u> Applications Based on Revolutionary War Service, ca. 1800-ca. 1912

Applications and other records pertaining to claims for pensions and bounty land warrants for service in the Revolutionary War. Records contain information pertaining to a soldier's rank, unit, and period of service, his age or date of birth, his residence, and sometimes his birthplace.
